

Friends – Greetings from the One Acre Fund family!

Pictured at right is one of our bookkeepers Irene Khaoya and her daughter, who is aptly-named "Precious." Irene provides all of the computer support for a district of 35 staff, and tracks each of their 3,500 clients in her computer database. It is a pretty big job! She has developed rapidly, and it is not an uncommon sight to see her calmly typing away, amidst a sea of papers.

Irene is one of more than 200 field staff members that make One Acre Fund run. It is their hard work – keeping track of client data in the office, or sweating in the hot fields – that makes hope possible for our 12,000 farm families. Their dedication brings inspiration to me every time I interact with them.



I believe that Irene's daughter, Precious, is also a reminder of the importance of each person that we employ, and each person that we serve. <u>Every human being is precious</u>. That is an important value that we hold very dearly here at One Acre Fund.

Our program continues to grow rapidly, with your generous support. This is our seventh 6-monthly report, which offers a frank look at the hard metrics we use to guide every step of our operations. From May 2009 – October 2009, we:

- Grew program size from 8,000 farm families to 12,000 farm families, serving more than 48,000 precious children
- Had our seventh harvest, increasing take-home farm income by 100% per acre, with 98% of farmers repaying program fees
- Covered 45% of our field costs through farmer repayments, which will improve over time

This report briefly concludes with our vision for the future, which we are truly excited about. We have a good start, but momentum is building at a terrific pace, and we are on track to create life-change for 70,000 families in the next 36 months. This momentum is largely due to you, our loudest supporters. On behalf of the children and families that we serve: **Thank You.**

One Acre Fund: Core Values and Program Model

The core values that drive us forward, and how our program works

Our mission: We empower persistently hungry farm families to grow their own way out of hunger.

Core values:

- We don't give handouts we empower permanent life-change. Lasting change must rely on the poor themselves.
- We provide a solution that is realistic for the <u>extreme</u> poor our solution includes tools, training, and market access making it realistic for someone starting from nothing to grow for high-value markets.
- We must dream big limitless human need demands an ambitious response. 80% of the extreme poor in the world are farmers, and we must aggressively scale to meet demanding milestones.
- We must remain 100% accountable to both our biggest donors and our littlest children, measured by hard operational metrics that are reported, good and bad, to stakeholders. If we are not improving the lives of children, we are failing, and must find a way to improve.

One Acre Fund's "Investment Bundle"

1) Creation of producer groups: One Acre Fund meets existing women's self-help groups, and organizes them into a producer group.



3) Extension: One Acre Fund field officers deliver education to groups, so they know how to grow the crop.



2) Farm inputs: One Acre Fund finances and delivers all of the planting materials that our farmers need to increase their yields.



4) Output market: One Acre Fund picks up our portion of increased harvest as repayment and



sells it to cover our field costs. We also sell the farmer portion of increased harvest when so desired. When harvests are low due to weather or crop disease, farmers are covered through crop insurance.

None of the individual pieces of our model is particularly new – but the *combination* of them is extremely unique. We have packaged together a holistic service that we can take to the poorest of farms – households starting with absolutely nothing. Our goal is to innovate a new program model that will be a new tool in the world's fight against hunger and poverty among the rural poor.

FUTURE ACTIONS:

- We will continue to focus on improving program financial sustainability. Our target is to cover 50% of our field expenses through farmer repayments, by the end of this calendar year.

Brief Management Discussion

1. Woman Power!

One Acre Fund is proud to announce that now have more than a dozen women managers in the organization!

We work in rural areas – places where talented women often do not have an opportunity to realize their full potential. One example is a field manager, Everlyne (pictured at center). We first met her when she was a farmer in our program – experiencing hunger every year before she started planting with One Acre Fund. She displayed such a strong work ethic and leadership ability that we decided to hire her as a field officer. In less than two years, she has advanced quickly, and is now a field manager, responsible for six field officers who are serving more than 600 farm families.

It is a true pleasure to see our field staff advance in their careers at One Acre Fund, particularly women who might not otherwise have a chance to realize their full potential. Everlyne, and many of her female colleagues, are inspiring leaders, wonderful mentors, and vibrant educators. They make One Acre Fund shine!



2. Was there a drought in Kenya?

The 2009 headlines were full of drought and disaster – and indeed, Kenya had one of its worst droughts in recent memory this year. Following on the heels of a poor harvest in 2008 due to postelection violence, food prices remained extremely high, and food shortages were rampant throughout the country. 2009 has been one of the hungriest years in this decade.

The solution of the international aid community was to increase food donations. This helped a little bit, but with the average Kenyan receiving only a few days' worth of food, we at One Acre Fund questioned the wisdom of this short-term solution.

Our farmers agreed – preferring to focus on growing food from their own fields. Although One Acre Fund harvests were generally down from 10-25%, careful plant spacing, proper fertilizer dosing (and a little luck) helped our farmers to produce bumper harvests. Many of our farmers produced the biggest harvests of their lives, and we even had farmers who refused their free portion of food aid.

This may seem obvious, but <u>the only permanent solution to hunger is for farmers to grow more food</u>. One Acre Fund helps hard-working farm families with the tools and training that they need to succeed – forever.




< Mobilization

∧ Key Performance Indicators

Field officers collect data weekly, including how many group meetings they hold and how many farmers they have enrolled.

These key performance indicators are reviewed each week in a Monday meeting and recorded by field managers to track progress.



A Field Officer Training One Acre Fund staffers are dedicated to helping improve their farmers' lives! Our field officers and managers attend weekly training sessions on topics such as contract signings and enrollment.

Each meeting begins with a song and a prayer, and includes kudos for staff accomplishments.

< Contract Signing >

Before One Acre Fund's farmers can receive seeds and fertilizer, they attend a two-hour contract meeting with their field officer. The field officer explains the contract terms, the loan amount farmers must repay, and the training One Acre will provide its farmers.





< A Group Formed

One Acre Fund requires that our farmers join as a group of six to twelve. Group members must live within two kilometers of each other so that they can plant and harvest as a group. This is the Nataline Group.

The Nataline Group comprises members of an existing self-help group that is led by Gentrix Makhanu, the woman in the red plaid shirt and long blue skirt. Gentrix heard about One Acre from a friend in a neighboring area, and she then convinced members of her self-help group to join One Acre together.





\wedge Training for Planting \wedge

These farmers are learning about how to plan for maximum crop yield. Our field officers teach them how to space their crops properly, how much fertilizer to use, and how often to weed their fields. At each session farmers are given easy-to-follow instruction sheets with drawings and pictures.

Vision for the Future

Can a promising experiment be scaled into a major force against world hunger?

We have a promising experiment, and we need to reach as many needy people as possible!

We have set an ambitious goal ...

We have set an extremely ambitious goal for the next 36 months: to begin expanding a program model that we have proven. Our milestones in the next three years are to:

- ① Create a 100% gain in farm income and a 50% reduction in child deaths
- 2 For 70,000 families
- 3 At 80%+ financial sustainability (farmer repayments covering 80% of field expenses)

We believe that if we can create a program model that achieves all of these goals, we will be in a position to grow to serve millions of lives in the coming decades. Millions of hungry farm families, feeding themselves – the hungry feeding the hungry.

We have a realistic plan ...

These are not idealistic words – they are carefully-constructed milestones, supported by our current field experience, and the advice of dozens of prominent advisors.
